

# 2014-2015 Highlights at Jefferson Hills

- We opened our Child/Youth
   Crisis Stabilization Units on
   12/1/14 as part of the Governor's
   Crisis System
- We hired 44.5 staff for the new Child/Youth CSUs
- Total staff increased to 254 employees with 237.5 Full Time Equivalents (FTE)
- Our budget increased 13% due to the addition of the Child/Youth Crisis Stabilization Units (CSU)
- Our education services at our Lakewood site were re-accredited through AdvancEd
- Motivational Interviewing, an evidence-based practice, became an agency-wide initiative
- New Vistas continued to provide inpatient, hospital alternative services to over 1,200 children/youth
- The Staff Secure Residential continued to provide residential services to youth in the youth corrections and county child welfare systems
- Jefferson Hills Academy continued to provide day treatment services to students with autism


#### Colorado's Crisis System


Jefferson Hills was pleased to develop and implement services as a part of the Governor's Crisis Services System, which opened on December 1, 2014. As part of the metro-Denver region, Community Crisis Connection, Jefferson Hills opened Colorado's only Child/Youth CSUs, one at each of our sites in Lakewood and Aurora. The Child/Youth CSUs operate as part of a continuum of crisis services that include the statewide hotline 303 844 – TALK (8255), mobile crisis teams, walk-in centers, and adult CSUs. With a total capacity of 30 beds, the 2 sites offer the flexibility for males and females, ages 5 – 21. A single point of entry through the admissions line for New Vistas provides ease of access and efficiencies.


Based on the tag line "When you don't know where to start, start here," access to services starts with a self-identified crisis and either making the phone call or walking into a center, 24/7/365. Eliminating barriers to access is the goal. Staffed with 24/7/365 licensed clinician and nurse, the Child/Youth CSUs provide immediate mental and physical health screenings, safety planning, and solid aftercare plans. Jefferson Hills treated about 500 children/youth in our first 6 months of operation.




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
## **Strategic Directions**
